Uki Hall Trustees appointed by Jayne Parrott

The big news for this edition is the Department of Lands gazette announcement of the appointment of seven Trustees to the Board of the Uki Public Hall & Recreation Reserve Trust. The Trustees, who will serve the community for a five year term, are all enthusiastic about this commitment and looking forward to some productive teamwork.

The new Board consists of Carolyn Jones, Bruce Ray, Jayne Parrott, Mary Lee Connery, Kevin Donaldson, Wayne Fraser and Kay Bristow. By special resolution Esma Thompson has been appointed to continue as treasurer. The restoration project has made great progress thanks to major funding received under the CDSE (Community Development & Support Expenditure) Scheme run by Clubs NSW.

With the help of volunteer tradies Trevor Scott . Chris Webster. Matt, Wayne, Kevin, Lance Westren and Jim Murrell - the water damaged front wall has been repaired and braced. Plantation Shutters, Murwillumbah, were employed to manufacture, install and repair fire doors to meet Council requirements. New locks were installed by Dave from Gav's Locks, to meet Fire Safety regulations, and other projects have been also been completed. The remainder of the funding will be used for repairs to areas damaged by termites. Thanks to this funding from Clubs NSW the Trust will now be able to reapply to Council for renewal of our license to operate. We were also excited to receive a grant from Tweed Council this week to repolish the floors. (continued page 4)

BreastScreen visits Uki

The BreastScreen mobile unit will be coming to Uki on Monday 3 November to provide women from the area with free mammograms.

The visit is part of a trial program to determine the need for screening services in smaller rural areas. October is Breast Cancer Awareness month—a timely reminder that one in eight women will be diagnosed with Breast Cancer in their lifetime. Approximately 900 NSW women lose their lives to the disease each year.

Mammograms remain the best defence against Breast Cancer, enabling cancers to be detected in the very early stages, when they are about the size of a pea. Without screening, lumps are more likely to be noticed when they are much more advanced, about the size of a small cherry.

If treated in the early stages, the chances of survival from Breast Cancer are very good. The five year survival rate for localised disease is 97%, however this rate decreases as the disease spreads.

Women in the highest risk age group of 50-69 are encouraged to have two-yearly mammograms, however all women over the age of 40 are eligible for screening (including those over 70).

Appointments take approximately 10 minutes and can be made by telephoning 13 20 50 (for the cost of a local call).

The bus will be located in the Buttery Car Park and will be offering screening over two days, Monday 3 and Tuesday 4 November.

If women are unable to attend during this time, a new permanent facility has been opened at Tweed Heads, providing free screening all year round.

Here is the experience of one local lady –

'My experience may help those of you who are undecided about the value of the BreastScreen program.

I started BreastScreen mammograms at age 50. Each subsequent 2-year reminder was greeted with little enthusiasm due to the inconvenience and discomfort involved, but nevertheless, I would 'front up'. I was always very pleased to hear that 'no abnormality was detected'.

However, I put my last reminder aside for a while. It took a further reminder letter to jolt me into action. I had to go up to the new Tweed Heads Hospital screening facility for the scan.

This time, there was no reassuring message. I received a recall, and had to go to BreastScreen Lismore for further investigation. In my case, an area of tissue thickening was of concern - a biopsy confirmed early stage breast cancer. The diagnosis was devastating as I was not aware of any problem before I had the mammogram. The early detection gave me options for treatment and a better prognosis. I am now receiving excellent care, thanks to the many people who have become involved since my diagnosis.'

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Infertility-strategies for hope

One of the most distressing health issues people can experience is infertility. According to ACCESS, an Australian organization for those who are experiencing infertility, around 15 percent of couples have difficulties conceiving. Conception and pregnancy are complicated processes that depend upon many factors, including:

- The production of healthy sperm
- The production of healthy eggs
- The production of a healthy embryo
- Functional fallopian tubes
- The sperm's ability to fertilise the egg when they meet
- The ability of the fertilised egg (embryo) to become implanted and retained in the uterus

- The hormonal environment.
 When just one of these factors is impaired, infertility can result.
 Major causes and risk factors that can contribute to the incidence of infertility include the following:
- Stress—extended periods of stress lead to elevated levels of glucocorticoids, which inhibit ovarian function.
- Structural reproductive disturbances (due to trauma, genetics, mumps, etc)
- Functional reproductive disturbances, such as hormone irregularities, Polycystic Ovarian Syndrome, cervical mucous problems, endocrine disturbances, nutritional deficiencies and age.

Careful assessment of all the factors contributing to infertility is essential to ensure that an effective treatment plan is created. Natural therapies can play a very important role in potentiating natural conception and/or supporting and improving outcomes with assisted conception. Diagnostics such a saliva test tracking the full menstrual cycle can provide invaluable insight into the levels of oestrogen, progesterone, testosterone and the stress hormone DHEA-S. Other important factors can be developing individually tailored dietary and lifestyle guidelines, improvement of stress levels and stress management, detoxifying the whole system and the regulation of endocrine function and all the relevant hormone levels.

Whilst it is very, very important not to raise false hopes, it is definitely possible to improve, strengthen, balance and potentiate fertility. Don't delay taking action – support is available.

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Birdwatching

Laughing Kookaburra (Dacelo novaequineae)

The Laughing Kookaburra is the largest member of the kingfisher family (41 to 47 cm), but unlike most of its relatives it is sedentary and occupies the same territory the year round. Before the spring breeding season, when family groups adjust their boundaries, an observer can actually locate the territories by listening to the noisy choruses at dusk. Kookaburras live in woodlands and open forests and do not need access to water to survive.

Their diet consists mainly of insects and other small invertebrates, but they also eat snakes, lizards, rodents and small birds. Kookaburras are pale below, with a brown crown and a dark brown ear patch. The eye is also brown, as is the wing, but the latter is mottled with pale blue. Older males have a blue-



green coloured centre rump.
Immature birds have a shorter,
dark bill and fine brown scallops.
Mature birds have large bills that
are black above and pale below.
All have a lighter brown tail with
dark brown bars and a white tip.

Pairs are territorial. Groups often form, with a dominant pair and subordinate helpers. Kookaburras perch watchfully and make sloping glides down onto prev. Flight is level and direct, showing white wing patches. Voice is the familiar 'hook, hook, hook' rising to a shouted 'hook, hook, hook-haha-ha', slowing the chuckles answered by others in the group. Breeding - September to January. Nest is made in a level tree hollow up to 20m high, a hole in a bank or aerial termite nest. Eggs - 2 or 3, white and roun-

Range and status – mainland Eastern Australia from Cape York (Old) to Eyre Peninsula (SA). Kookaburras were introduced to WA in 1897, Tasmania in 1905, Kangaroo Island in 1926 and Flinders Island in 1940. They are common and sedentary.

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Spring is in the air

It's that time of year again and there's a busy time ahead for Tweed Valley Wildlife Carers. I have just returned from a trip to Africa and must say with relief that at least our wildlife doesn't come in the shapes and sizes I have seen over there! To rear and rehabilitate a baby elephant requires a carer to be with them 24 hours a day for two years and then to virtually live out bush, watching over them until they can integrate into the wild herds. It is an incredible example of true commitment and hard work. Our orphans come in much smaller packages, but still require time, patience and care to bring them to the stage of rehabilitation and release. This is where our dedicated carers come in, and at this special time of the year, we are usually inundated with lots of babies, who have been tossed, fallen, blown or forced by some other means, out of their cosy nests.

Tweed Valley Wildlife Carers also perform many other tasks, such as fundraising, transport, rescue and locating suitable sites for release. The frontline troops are the phone volunteers, who answer calls from the general public needing assistance with an injured animal, making enquiries or just needing advice.

Like all volunteer organisations we are always looking for people who are willing to give some of their time to assist us in the important role of caring for our native wildlife. If you share these ideals and are willing to spare some time to lend a hand or an ear, please contact our group on 02 6672 4789. Orientation days and wildlife workshops are held throughout the year to keep carers up to date with the latest techniques on rescue, care and rehabilitation.

CRAG Update

Tweed Shire Council have until 3 October 2008 to lodge a 'Facts and Contentions' submission to the Land and Environment Court concerning the Nightcap Township development. There are several issues that TSC will be highlighting in its submission regarding this proposed development of which the developer has not addressed to Council's satisfaction as yet. These include:

 Lack of adequate consultation regarding Indigenous issues;
 Inadequate addressing of stormwater catchment;

- Issues with the proposed sewer system;
- Issues with the proposed road structure;
- 5. Inadequate access to the area:
- Issues surrounding the question of suitable drinking water.

When the Land and Environment Court receives this submission from TSC, a date will be set for all the facts to be heard by an independent expert, established by the

Kunghur Fire Brigade

People are reminded that we are in the Fire Permit season. It is required by law that all fires, excluding cooking fires, have a Permit. As stated on the Permit Form, the person issued with the Permit, must notify all adjoining neighbours 24 hours before lighting up. The law states that lighting a fire, in Permit season, without a Permit can incur a fine of \$550 and failing to notify neighbours also has a fine of \$550. People have been reporting fires to 000 when they have seen smoke from a distance without investigating that it is a permitted fire which is under control. Not only does an unnecessary callout take up the time of the volunteer crews it also is embarrassing for the property owner when the fire trucks turn up with lights flashing and sirens wailing. 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STELLA WILKIE -'THIS IS YOUR LIFE'

Life Membership of the Uki Garden Club Inc. was presented to Stella Wilkie on 26 June 2008. Here is a 'potted history' of Stella's amazing life.

Stella was born in New Zealand. lived a happy childhood there, married, widowed, was married again, and widowed again. She has always been an active member of her community.

In New Zealand Stella belonged to many gardening societies. Stella grew roses and camellias with great skill in grafting and layering. She enjoyed floral art and 'did' many floral presentations for weddings, fashion parades, and displays at the large emporium where she was the Head Cashier for 20

When WW2 was declared in 1938 Stella joined the Red Cross as a Voluntary Nursing Aide (VAD) and was subsequently awarded a Medal of Merit for her services. All through the War she worked and did her VAD duties at a hospital every weekend.

Stella's mother came to live with her when her husband was ill and was cared for by Stella for the rest of her life.

Stella retired from paid employment in 1960 and started her world travels, visiting the Middle East. Greece, Egypt, Jordan and Austria, then Canada - Quebec, Montreal and Vancouver.

In 1997, at the age of 81, Stella came to Australia. She lived in Uki with her sister and brother-in-law

Hilda and Rozaire Brulotte but moved to Mountainview Village when her sight started to deterio-

Stella has always had varied interests - focused on arts, crafts and gardening. She commenced painting at age 86 and has converted her garage at the village to her art studio where she can be found working away on oils, silks, pastels and water-colours.

When the Uki Garden Club was formed in 1998 Stella was one of the early members. Ten years later. Stella is still an active member of the Club, always ready with ideas, suggestions and tips for successful propagation and garden maintenance. What a woman! Well done, Stella.

8 pieces of chicken

½ cup dry sherry

2 tbls oil

2 tbls vinegar

2 tbls honey

2 tbls tomato paste or purée

1 tbls cornflour

1 clove garlic, crushed

1 tsp grated ginger

Salt and pepper

Do you need faster broadband?

Most of you will now be enjoying the benefits of broadband internet faster speeds, VOIP phones and faster communication abilities. But did you know the exchange at Uki can now handle 8 Meg connections for ADSL and that Telstra have now installed ADSL 2+? This new ADSL2+ connection speed can be up to 20 Meg - but don't rely on this speed. First of all you must have a modem capable to run ADSL2+: many modems are able to be updated with 'firmware' to make this possible. ADSL 2+ is not guaranteed to run at the maximum speed of 20,000/1000 as it depends on many factors. The speed

is 'best effort' in other words up to 20,000 mbps.

No one has ripped you off if your connection isn't that fast; you're simply not getting the max speed because of distance from exchange, gauge of cable, quality of cabling, distance, looping, etc. ADSL is a distance based technology – the further from the exchange the slower speed you get. It's basic physics.

Later in the year the competition will arrive to set up their connections. The sooner the better I say as Bigpond ADSL2+ is not cheap compared to their offers. It may be better to wait.

The 8 Meg connection is worth considering. Having had it for a few months I enjoyed incredible download speeds and great performance from my VOIP connection. Mind you it was also great for the family; they have their own computers on the home network and just LOVE downloading: (I ended up returning to a 1.5 Meg connection due to the cost, which was \$69.00 for 18 Gigs of download.

So think about these new connection speeds if you are frustrated with your broadband connection.
