#### The Ball in the Hall

Joy Armour turned 87 recently. She and her close friend, Ida Daly, a sprightly 80 year old, organised this year's Uki Country Ball. Mind you, they're not without experience. They've been attending these balls for over 20 years. And their evening was a great success – more than a hundred dancers turned out and they raised \$1,070 towards the restoration of Uki Hall.

Ida describes the ball as 'four generations of family fun'. With a little help from friends, Joy and Ida prepared twelve large loaves worth of sandwiches and over three hundred cakes. 'Not a sandwich too many,' said Joy, 'and hardly a cake left.' 'That's the Ball,' nodded Ida.

The Uki Ball is one of thirteen in the 'Miss Tweed Country Balls' circuit which culminates in the final held in Murwillumbah in September. They've been running for 37 years; one of the founders, Aub Gresham from Crystal Creek, has attended over 400.

Some see them as an anachronism, and wonder how long they can occupy the same venue as, for example, the Glo Dance. But if this ball was anything to go by, their future is assured. All four generations were very well represented.

And there were some enthusiastic new dancers from Uki. Lisa Gair said she 'couldn't believe what she'd been missing out on', describing the evening as 'great fun'. For more information call 6672 5361.

### Green Corps graduation day

July 22 saw the graduation of the Green Corps team that has been active in the village for the past 6 months. A great debt of gratitude is owed to the team for their efforts over this period. We have witnessed a transformation of the Tweed river bank behind the village and in the area now known as Centenary Park, (the large public space at the junction of the river and Rowland's Creek.)

In addition, the team has been active in garden maintenance around the Historical Society building, Hall park, War Memorial and park opposite the hotel, planting and maintenance at the Sports Ground, installation of bollards at the Buttery as well as weed control in the park opposite Glenock Rd. Under the guidance of expert team leader, Douglas Meggatt, Green Corps members also assisted with the provision of advice and support to the Uki Primary School planting day in Centenary Park. This event, organised by Eddie Roberts, succeeded in planting around 600 trees/shrubs. As part of their training, the team was also involved in


plant propagation work at the Uki Community Nursery. The team was also responsible for the construction of 25 Indian Mynah traps and the eradication of the invasive weed 'Coral Berry' in the lower reaches of Rowland's Creek.

Retaining full facilities at Murwillumbah Hospital was considered essential in light of rising sea levels and the low elevation of Tweed Heads Hospital.

#### Online storage

We're wedded to the hard drive as a storage medium, but despite the excitement of seeing terabyte drives in stores for around \$300. getting unlimited storage gratis clearly offers better value. Hard drives have many things going for them, the chief of which is they offer fast access to files because they're attached to your PC. But with free, unlimited online storage on offer, can it be long before we dump our hard drives? Now we're in the broadband era, and traffic quotas from ISPs are increasing, Xdrive.com offers 5GB of free dedicated storage but wants money before they dole out any

more. Why bother with that when I have a 16GB USB drive on my key -ring?

Online storage will take off when we learn to let go of the desktop, folder and files structure, and let our files fall where they may. 'Share on Ovi' doesn't look like an online drive; it's more a social networking site like Flickr. You upload photos to share with friends, family and the world, and to do things with them, not to back them up, but the free unlimited storage encourages you to upload all your photos – or at least the ones you'd care about losing if your hard drive crashed.

It will take some more innovative services, more affordable broadband internet plans and a mental shift on our part for online storage to reach its full potential. Once we feel comfortable doing the same for other file types, online storage will become at least a complementary option to hard drives, if not a complete replacement.

May God bless you with enough foolishness to believe that you can make a difference in this world; so that you can do what others claim cannot be done.




#### Cycling in Uki

375 ml evaporated skim milk 1 ½ tbls custard powder 1 tsp vanilla essence 1 tbls sugar 2 eggs separated

Combine evaporated milk and custard powder in a saucepan and bring to boil. Reduce heat and simmer 2 min. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla essence, sugar and beaten egg yolks.



#### Birdwatching

Australian Magpie Gymnorhina tibicen (38 to 44cm)

There are three races of this bird – the local race (tibicen) is the black-backed magpie and is the nominate form. The white-backed race (hypoleuca) is found in southern NSW, Victoria and SA, and race dorsalis is found in WA. The dorsalis male is similar to the white-backed male, but the dorsalis female is considerably darker on the back of neck and upper back than the female white-backed form.

This bird feeds mostly on the ground, eating grubs, worms and insects. Resident territorial groups and other aggregations play and skirmish noisily. Their flight is swift and direct with a characteristic noisy lashing of the wings, and reveals the angled white bars on the black underwings. Magpies are



aggressive to humans near their nest, and will kill smaller birds and mice. Magpies can be tame in parks and gardens.

Voice: a rich, mellow organ-like carolling, often by several at night, and a quiet sub-song that includes mimicry.

Habitat: almost anywhere there

are trees and open areas of bare soft ground or grass – orchards, golf courses, playing fields, gardens etc.

Breeds: June to December.
Nest is a compact shallow
bowl of sticks, lined with grass,
rootlets, hair etc. It is made in
a fork or on a branch towards
the outer part of a tree 5 to 16
m high, though sometimes
also in shrubs near the ground.

Eggs: 2 – 3 occasionally up to five. They are grey, brown, pale blue – typically blue-green spotted brown.

Range and status: entire continent except the driest deserts, far Top End, Groote Eylandt and the far north Cape York. Also found in Papua New Guinea, and was introduced to New Zealand.

#### **Probiotic Power**

#### by Judith Magee

Our intestines are home to an astonishing number of micro-flora both good and bad. The 'bad' ones, such as Escherichia coli. Salmonella and Clostridium, are generally kept in check by the 'good' bacteria. Without the proper balance within the gut flora, food may be poorly digested and absorbed, leading to nutritional deficiency. In addition, many 'bad' bacteria produce toxic by-products, which can damage the gut wall, compromising gut function and potentially leading to 'leakygut' (damaged intestinal walls allow toxins to pass through into the blood stream) - a contributing factor in many chronic health problems. New research also points to the critical role the micro-flora play in the immune system. Studies are confirming that the immune system is not a specific entity in itself, but an interaction between our cells

and the 'foreign' intestinal flora. 'About 75 percent of the immune cells are localised to the gut, and almost all immune cells in the body are conditioned in the gut', says Professor Stig Bengmark of University College, London.

Probiotic ('for life') yoghurts, drinks and supplements have become commonplace. Probiotic supplements, which contain millions of the 'good' bacteria, have largely been used to restore or maintain gut health, particularly after taking antibiotics. Whilst this is a very important application, there is increasing recognition of the wider therapeutic roles for many of the probiotic strains. For example, clinical applications of *Saccharomyces boulardii* (SB) can include:

 Strengthens gastrointestinal immunity

- Leaky gut decreases gut permeability and increases nutrient absorption
- Ameliorate food sensitivities/ allergies
- May assist in the management of medically diagnosed Irritable Bowel Syndrome
- Management of mild digestive disturbances
- Diarrhoea as a preventative and symptom reliever.

Caution – anyone who has had a perforated bowel or bowel surgery, and those with a true yeast allergy should avoid SB until other gut work has been done. For individualised advice about the potential relevance or benefits of probiotic supplementation for you, consult a qualified health professional.



As a response to hooning behaviour, the Police through Tweed/Byron Highway Patrol have introduced new measures to enable the community to assist in stamping out this dangerous practice.

Offenders can be dealt with in two ways: they are either detected by Police while committing the offence, or Police can respond to a community observation of the offence.

The Tweed/Byron Command has provided us in Uki with Incident Report Forms that can be used by residents who observe this hooning behaviour. Residents need to be aware that reporting these incidents to the Police in this way may involve having to attend court as a witness in any prosecution.





#### Build your own bush rocks part 2

In the last issue, I covered the first stages of making your own bush rocks, ending up with the basic shape made and covered with the first layer of mortar. The basic structure then needs to be given a finishing layer.

- 1. Add black oxide cement colouring to your mortar mix as a base colour, and trowel the mortar over the rock form. This layer must be brought to the finished shape, complete with cracks, edges, flaking bits etc.
- 2. Surface colouring comes

next, before the mortar layer sets. I sprinkle the surface, unevenly and sparingly, with a red/brown oxide cement colouring, followed by more of the black oxide, and then pat down the surface with a torn piece of poly foam. Next, add final details with a medium paint-brush and small tools.

3. Finally, sprinkle it unevenly with yellow and green oxide, and perhaps adjust the colour further. Last of all, take a couple of handfuls of dirt or small gravel and throw it hard at the rock. This will

pit the surface.

That's it. You now have a rock made to your own specifications, which will only get better looking as it weathers and acquires a natural patina. As a final touch, you could make an unobtrusive opening into the hollow centre of the rock for the benefit of little critters.

Note; casting plaster and Hessian, together with premixed mortar, are all available at JH Williams plumbing and building supplies section in Buchanan Street.
