The roof is well and truly beyond the end of its life and we have had quotes indicating that the total cost of the project will be of the order of \$70,000. This is to cover replacement of all the upper windows, removal. refurbishment and replacement of the five large air vents at the top, new colourbond roofing all over, guttering and downpipes as well as the refurbishment/replacement of the facia boards. This is, by far the largest expense faced by the Resident's Association as we move along the path of full restoration of this Uki I want to acknowledge the patience of the tenants at the Buttery as they have had to endure the inconvenience of a leaking roof with the



Birdwatchers ...

Shining Bronze Cuckoo (chrysococcyx lucidus) 16-18 cm



Australian race plagosus. Bronze green above, head purplish-brown, face under parts white with tiny bronze-brown bars. eye pale brown. Immature grey-brown, whitish below, shadowy bars develop. Nominate race greener, forehead scalloped white. They appear as singles or in parties. Courting males chase with staccato calls and spread wings. Flight is swift with pale wing bar. Similar species Horsefield, Little Bronze cuckoos. Voice is like person whistling dog - fwee-fweefwee each note rising strongly, descending staccato pee-eeerr. Habitat: rainforest, forest woodland gardens. Breeds August-January. Egg-one olivebronze in nest of thorn-bill, fairy-wren, scub-wren, flycatcher, silvereye honeyeater. Status: Race plagosus; breeding migrant to coastal SE Australia and SW Western Australia - October-April. Birds from SE Australia winter in Qld, Papua New Guinea, East Indonesia. Birds from SW Western Australia in West Indonesia. Eggs of the Shining Bronze Cuckoo are sometimes found in the domed nests of warblers and sunbirds as well as the wrens, and it is not known how they get there. The cuckoo is known to lay its eggs directly in

cup-shaped nests, but these domed nests have only a small entrance hole, too small for a cuckoo. There is an old idea that the cuckoo lays its egg on the ground, picks it up in its bill and places it in the nest, but this has never been proved by observation. The egg of the Shining Bronze Cuckoo has been found in the nests of at least 65 other species. It usually chooses domes nests. It eats mainly caterpillars and other insects and is common chiefly in the wetter forests of the eastern and southern areas of Australia. The Shining Bronze Cuckoo can be identified from the other three adult bronze cuckoos found in the local area. The Horsefield has a prominent eye stripe, a rufous patch in its tail, and a break in the horizontal stripes down its belly, leaving a white area not found in the other three adult cuckoos. All the immature bronze cuckoos are similar, all having very faint breast stripes with a wide break down the front and belly in the stripes. The other bronze cuckoos found in this area are the Little, which has a red eye with a black pupil. The male, a shining black top t the head and a few rufous feathers in the tail, with a white tip. The female has a pale creamy green to fawn iris with a brownish pupil. The Gould's bronze cuckoo's general colouring is more bronze on back and wings as compared to either the Shining or Little Bronze cuckoos, which have a definite greenish tinge. The eye ring of the Gould's is red in the male and pale grey to tan in the female. All of the Bronze cuckoos appear in this area from October - April.

The collection comes after a time of grief when Natascha and Stephanie's mother, died at home after a six month struggle with cancer. As all the Babareki Beads pieces art collections. every bead is a unique handmade creation. The stones collection. designed to resemble stone stacks, are tied together with knotted cord. A limited number of pieces have been created and will be available from the Babareki Beads Studio gallery Uki and from selected outlets. 
How many days must I wonder

Uki Weather Report...

We finished up the month of July with a total of 51.5 mm, as no more rain fell between my last Weather Report and the end of the month. This is a roughly average rainfall for July, much better than the 20.4 mm we had last year. August was a great disappointment to me this year-the rain that I hoped for failed to arrive, and we ended the month with the miserable total of only 20.6 mm. This is less than half the average; so much for the wet month I anticipated. Still, on the up side, we had more than twice the rainfall this

year than last year, when we received a measly 9.6 mm for the month. August was also warmer than usual, continuing this winter's above-average temperatures. To time of writing, (12th) September has also been warm and somewhat damper. A delightful thunderstorm on the evening of the eleventh boosted the total up to 18.6 mm, which is about half the average for the month. With any luck September won't be quite as dry as I anticipated, though we have a way to go




I Remember...

About 1947 or 1948 Uki got electricity and everyone got a wireless. 

Take heart though - my prediction record hasn't been all that great lately, I could well be wrong!






Does that baby bird really need rescuing? By Tweed Valley Wildlife Carers Spring is here and that means baby birds! Tweed Valley Wildlife Carers are inundated each spring and summer by calls from well-intentioned people who have 'rescued' a baby bird. However, statistically, over 75% of young birds that are rescued are, in fact, not orphans at all, are being well cared for, and don't actually need anyone's help! When you find a baby bird, if it is unhurt, before making any decision to intervene, stop and watch for a while and take action as follows: If the baby bird is fully feathered, able to perch and hop around, it will usually be no more than 2 -3 days away from flying. At this age it is probably a youngster learning to fly and they often jump or tumble out of the nest. The mother will continue to protect and feed it on the ground or in a shrub while it learns to use its wings. If the parents are still feeding or calling to it, either do nothing or perch the bird in a heavy shrub or low tree, and keep pets and children away. Observe from a distance for about 2 hours and if its


mother doesn't appear, or if you're sure she's dead, the bird will need to come into care. In the case of partially-feathered chicks, with some exposed skin, or a mixture of down and pin feathers, either return them to the original nest, or make an artificial one using an old ice-cream container, with



some drainage holes, lined with dry grass. Hang this on a tree branch closest to where found, away from the trunk and with overhead branches for protection. Observe from a distance. Once you have left, the parents should reappear and begin feeding baby. Again, if mother does not appear, the baby may need to come into care. With either no feathers

or only a light downy coat, hatchlings cannot survive very long without warmth. If it is clear the parents are around, return the chicks to the nest and make sure that the parents begin caring for them within a short time. Otherwise, they will need to come into care. While waiting for a carer, keep the babies very warm, on a wrapped hot-water bottle, in box. Some baby birds such as Brushturkeys are on their own when hatched, fully independent. Leave it alone, unless injured or in danger from environment, eg cats, unhappy gardeners, etc. Of course, in any case, if a chick is injured, gently pick it up in a towel, and put both bird and towel into a wellventilated box. Place a hot water bottle underneath the towel - all injured animals need warmth. Do not give it food or water; just call TVWC's 24hr service -6672-4789 - immediately. Remember, most of the time, the best thing we can do for a baby bird is to simply leave it alone. A wild animal's chance of survival is greatly increased when left in its natural environment, being raised by its natural parents, not human substitutes.




Uki Garden Club

Water Ways

September 1st is traditionally said to be the start of spring and this year it started as if by clockwork. Suddenly the warmer weather got us all thinking of the hot weather ahead over summer, and the need to keep our gardens growing, often with little water because of the increasing drought events we have had the last few years. Uki village has already experienced water restrictions due to repairs done on the corroded filter tank for village water supplies. However there are precautions we can take now to waterproof our gardens for summer. The best advice is to seriously think about mulching your garden preferably with coarser materials, as finer materials such as lawn clippings can matt down and actually prevent rain getting through to the soil. Group your plants into drought tolerant areas, through to the more fragile plants so you can really be specific about your watering. Do use soaker hoses, soil wetting agents in your potting soils, and water your plants in the



evening when it can do the plants the most good.

Have a think about joining a group such as the Uki Garden Club and get local knowledge from other keen gardeners. Membership only costs \$20 per household and this includes a very informative monthly newsletter. Members can join up with any or all of the 3 sub-groups: the Food group, the Flower Arranging group and the Movie Group. Anyone is welcome to come to a meeting to see if you'd like to join our group. Members meet on the last Saturday of the month at a different member's garden for an informal meeting and buy or swap plants, seeds or excess produce; go for a wander around the garden; have a chat about gardening in general; borrow some gardening books from our library and share a great afternoon tea.







FROM PAST TO PRESENT

On exhibition UNTIL Sunday 9 October

The Lindt Collection is an exhibition of stunning photographs taken in Grafton in the 1870's by JW Lindt. This rare collection, on loan from Grafton Regional Gallery, contains images representing members of the Gumbaynggirr, Bundjalung and Yaegl nations. The detailed pictures capture skin textures and intricate scarification, jewellery, clothes, tools, weapons and utensils.

Black Abstract presents the work of two of Australia's most celebrated and accomplished indigenous artists, sisters Ada Bird and Gloria Petyarre. As Anmatyarr custodians, the sisters paint the stories, symbols and patterns of their country Anungra, located 250kms NE of Alice Springs.

Lights Out is a Flying Arts touring exhibition of etchings and photographs by Glen O'Malley and Ron McBurnie displayed alongside the works of four poets that explores the theme of the drive-in theatre and its gradual disappearance.

Lucid by local artist Gabriela Soelkner presents a series of explorations on canvas and paper that go in search of a lucid moment. In Soelkner's words, she seeks what is "alive" by "allowing the picture to tell its own story."

Heritage Riverwalk





Since the last issue, we've had some changes at the CTC. One of our longest serving and hardest working volunteers, Lesley provided a graphic art service




