On Easter Saturday 2015, The Uki Fair Trade Shoppe opened its doors.

From the very first day, the community was very friendly and welcoming. I knew that this venture was going to be the most wonderful fulfilling and joyous journey. I wasn't disappointed.

The Fair Trade Shoppe (the Shoppe) has welcomed returning visitors from overseas and all over Australia, some famous celebrities and the precious local community.

An American teacher told me that it was the best shop in the world!

I always wanted the Shoppe to be a tribute to the amazing, gentle artisans who hand create the exquisite range of handicrafts that grace the three rooms and two hallways.

My journey with fair trade began as a World Vision volunteer in the 1970s.

Although I continued my nursing career, my enduring passion was fair trade craft.

Having met many fair trade artisans who rely on their craft for their livelihood, I felt a strong desire to support them by creating a space here in Australia where their beautiful work could be showcased and sold.

I've had the privilege of sitting with these talented artisans in the communities where they live and work, places like Bangladesh, India, Peru, Thailand, and the Philippines. I've witnessed their incredible craftsmanship firsthand, and more importantly, I've listened to their stories, learned about their cultures, and seen the passion and pride they pour into every piece they create.

The Shoppe has a serene feeling.

I sometimes referred to it as a sanctuary, a place of peace. Many customers have echoed this feeling.

The whole aim of the Shoppe has always been to uplift the lives of artisans living in the developing world by selling their hand made craft.

This kindness and gentleness has flowed through to the customers.

Some of you may know that I have not lived in Uki for the last two years. My heartfelt thanks to Christine and Judith who have carried the spirit of the Fair Trade Shoppe in my absence.

At the present time we do not know the date of closing.

Be sure to visit and purchase your "fair trade treasures" while you can. There are lots of greatly reduced items available. Rest assured that despite our reduced prices, the artisans have all been paid a fair wage for their work. Some of the more popular lines have already sold out.

Thank you to everyone for your friendship, the wonderful chats and your valuable purchases.

You have given love and hope to so many dear people.

There's a call out to local healers to join a community support network, and for anyone inspired to live more sustainably, a new ecovillage is forming and looking for like-minded neighbours.



These kits were created by local volunteers to help new residents in Uki and nearby communities (from Dum Dum to Mount Burrell) know where to find help, access services, explore things to do, and how to get involved and become part of this region's ongoing story.

While the kit focuses predominantly on services and groups in Uki, we have endeavoured to provide information for folks who live closer to Nimbin and Murwillumbah too.

The kit contains information about: a brief history of Uki Village; information services and village facilities; sports, arts and leisure activities; educational facilities; transport; churches and





places of worship; medical services and animal health; volunteering and community services; and how to make sure you're aware of and prepared for emergencies and disasters.

News from the Member for Lismore

Rural housing reform

I welcome the announcement of a Parliamentary inquiry into rural housing and second dwellings.

I have spoken about our housing crisis in Parliament championing the simplification of having secondary dwellings on land in rural and regional areas. My farmer groups have also approached me about the need for planning reforms so they can build extra houses on their land.

I have discussed secondary dwellings with the Minister for Planning Paul Scully and it was raised with him at the recent Community Cabinet in Tweed Heads. We all support this inquiry and eagerly await its findings and recommendations.

The Select Committee on Rural Housing and Second

Dwellings Reform will conduct the inquiry and report back by February 2026.

Under the terms of reference, the committee will inquire into, and report on, reforms to facilitate the building of second dwellings in rural zones, potential amendments to state environment planning policies, the benefits and risks of secondary dwellings and interaction between secondary dwellings and potential impacts on rural activities.

The terms of reference also cover issues such as, the potential impacts of reforms on housing affordability, multi-generational living and rural population growth.

I know this an area of local interest, and I will inform you when they are calling for submissions. There are several aspects to consider, and I know councils have concerns about rate assessments for secondary dwellings. That's something that can be resolved and

shouldn't impede reform.

down from Community Cabinet in Tweed for the official reopening of the Vic Bianchetti Sports Club. After the devastation of the 2022 floods the club has been rebuilt and upgraded with flood-resilient design and modern amenities thanks to \$1.2 million in funding from the NSW and Australian Governments. Having this hub of local sport and social activity back up and running is great news for Uki and the broader community.

From suffering to service

For more than 15 years, Uki local Karl Baumgartner lived with the debilitating effects of Chronic Fatigue Syndrome (CFS) a condition that left him physically exhausted and emotionally drained.

Repeatedly told by doctors that his tests were "normal" and he was "just depressed," Karl felt abandoned by the medical system and began seeking answers elsewhere.

His healing journey became inward and holistic. While addressing physical aspects like digestion, blood sugar, and immunity, he also explored the emotional roots of illness, from childhood trauma to chronic stress. "If you're unconsciously angry," he says, "that stress can stop healing."

Years of meditation, breathwork, qigong, and selfinquiry helped Karl gradually recover. His experience also inspired him to support others with chronic illness, and to advocate for community-based healing.

Today, Karl offers bodywork, energy healing, and emotional support sessions on a sliding scale. But his vision goes further: he's building a local network of healers, bodyworkers, therapists, energy workers, who can collaborate, share knowledge, and offer affordable, integrated care.

He believes healing is not a solo journey, but one supported by community.

Restoring our rivers

Uki RiverCare volunteers meet on the fourth Sunday of each month to restore riparian vegetation at Platypus Park. Thanks to steady work, around 1,000 young plants have now been planted, mulched, and weeded by dedicated volunteers.

Exciting developments are ahead: we're planning a weed identification and control workshop in November, in collaboration with a local bush regeneration company and Tweed Landcare. If you're interested in attending, contact details are below.


Uki has its share of highly invasive weeds, including Cats Claw Creeper, Madeira Vine, and Balloon Vine—all of which smother native plants and damage sensitive creekside areas. The good news? Bush regenerators have developed effective, low-impact control techniques. These can be easily learned and applied in home gardens, local bushland, or community sites like Platypus Park.

In the coming months, Uki RiverCare will begin opening walking paths through Platypus Park, providing greater access to the beautiful confluence of the Tweed River and Smiths Creek—a great spot to swim, walk, and relax in nature.

Our progress shows what a community can achieve. The image accompanying this article was taken in 2015, before National Tree Day. Back then, the site was a bare paddock; today, it's a thriving forest, restored by community.

Mountain of colours

Cameron Pitcher is a Uki- based photographic artist whose nature images are personal and intimate; softening the boundary between inside and outside; between the observer and the observed; between nature image and portrait.



Mountain of colours is a photographic exhibition that acknowledges and reflects the vibrant and ubiquitous cultural presence of the mountain (Mount Wollumbin) in our lives through a series of repeating colourful and resonant pop art images.

"At the heart of the caldera sits the mountain," Cameron says. "It looms above us, physically and culturally. It is a symbol of home and identity for those of us who live around it, or come from it.

We commodify and commercialise its image to brand our businesses and advertise our products. We feel its emanations and trace its contours looking for meaning, spiritual significance and a sense of the sacred. It rouses passionate feelings and attitudes and has become a political battleground for adversarial exchanges. It is a kind of local celebrity, a meme, a symbol of beauty, and a cliché".

Sticks and stones

Artist Peter Smith started making ceramics 50 years ago. After a long break he returned to the craft 8 years ago.

He uses found objects from the bush to combine with ceramics to create unique pieces.

Peter collects the fallen branches of certain native trees because they have interesting shapes and textures, not knowing exactly where they will be used.

While proficient on the wheel, Peter also makes handbuilt ceramic pieces, testing and refining ideas along the way.

Selecting timber pieces that naturally suit the ceramic project at hand, timber and clay come together with a spontaneity that often produces unexpected results. The works are continually evolving and the exhibition represents a moment in time of that evolution.

You are invited to the Sticks and stones opening on Friday 7 November of at 6pm. The exhibition will continue until 30 November and will feature alongside the work of the other Little Gallery artists.

Equinox eclipse shifts

At the time of writing we are in the middle of the last eclipse season of 2025. Not surprisingly the world's news reflects the cosmic intensity of this special period.

The effect of the September 21st solar eclipse will be felt for months because it coincides with the Equinox.


